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self portraits catch your eye they seem to do it deliberately walk into any art gallery and they draw attention to themselves come across them in the world's museums and you get a strange shock of recognition rather like glimpsing your own reflection for in picturing themselves artists reveal something far deeper than their own physical looks the truth about how they hope to be viewed by the world and how they wish to see themselves in this beautifully written and lavishly illustrated book laura cumming art critic of the observer investigates the drama of the self portrait from durer rembrandt and velazquez to munch picasso warhol and the present day she considers how and why self portraits look as they do and what they reveal about the artist's innermost sense of self as well as the curious ways in which they may imitate our behaviour in real life drawing on art literature history philosophy and biography to examine the creative process in an entirely fresh way cumming offers a riveting insight into the intimate truths and elaborate fictions of self portraiture and the lives of those who practise it a work of remarkable depth scope and power this is a book for anyone who has ever wondered about the strange dichotomy between the innermost self and the self we choose to present for posterity our face to the world

e the subject looking in the mirror is ego opposite ego is the self whose thinking has a different rhythm and order the initial mirror encounter ego observes passively and the encounter offers an opening for ego to use its cognitive understanding to make decisions and act ego observing the image in the mirror illustrates the expression that the ego looks into the depth of the soul ego looks at the true self which resides in the soul in the head or in the person's personality the mirror encounter invites the passive observing ego to become active and look deeply inside e this book presents a year's long study where the researcher artist engages herself within the activity of self portrait drawing facing the products and employing them both as research instruments and theme the research takes interests in this unique activity in its significance in an individual's or an artist's life and in psychological philosophical and artistic implications associated with and deriving therefrom the research integrates the artistic activity which is perceived as a research in itself

combined with a scientific research method bearing the spirit of a well grounded theory this book introduced the unique research method which is described as an art based research method further shedding a new broad light on the common phenomenon known as self portrait drawing

for a painter who took his earliest bearings from Rembrandt and who has defiantly espoused the values of Old Master painting the self portrait is a natural enough genre to pursue for Odd Nerdrum the attractions of self portraiture run much deeper however Nerdrum has frequently alluded to the conflicted preoccupation with origins and personal identity that his paintings express and traces this preoccupation to his discovery that his father was not the father he had known growing up but a previous lover of his mother's also abandoned by his mother at an early age he recalls of his early years I was a beggar in a world ruled by others the person I found in the mirror was myself I saw myself reflected in my own eyes not those of others Nerdrum's difficult childhood and the isolation he has endured as a painter have greatly intensified the relevance of the self portrait a genre at which he has excelled and for which he has become particularly well known this volume collects Nerdrum's self portraits for the first time with more than 100 color reproductions

maps the history of self portraiture from the earliest myths of Narcissus and the Christian tradition of bearing witness to the prolific self image making of today's contemporary artists
